Looks like migrating birds are heading up North to warmer weather and a bit of fun and this year I have decided to join them, for the same reasons, and to bring them back with me in Spring. In saying that migration hurries high predation and mortality, including hunting by humans (jeez!) and by starvation!! So here's hoping for the best and safe travelling for us both.

Autumn is generally a good month for a decent clean up and to feed your asparagus bed with compost, animal manure and seaweed. Gather leaves for your compost heap, fertilise your herbs, gather up pumpkins and marrows and dry well in the sun before storing away. Autumn is, in fact, natures planting season. That's when soil temperature is at its peak, making it the best to plant roots to snuggle into. Also the autumn rain mean plants have a couple of months to establish themselves before they shut down for winter. You can plant out hardy annuals, such as pansies, poppies, primulas, stock, violas and polyanthus directly in the soil now for an early spring/winter display.

Chocolate Cosmos that really smells like chocolate, Mandevilla Ruby Red, intense red trumpet flowers, Bergenia "Snow Cloud", Elephant's Ears, beautiful big leaves. Fatsia Japonica for indoor or outdoors. Lemon Verbena chunky plants, potted Irises, Spider plants Strelitzias and the very popular bath salts. And the big question; Will the Dog miss me?

Soil – what type do you have in your Garden?

It is one of the most important questions that I am going to ask you when you come in to select your plants. And if you are like me I have been battling clay soils that are like concrete in the summer and glue in the winter. So here are some helpful tips;

Sandy Soils - large particles and low nutrient content they drain quickly which can lead to drought stress for some plants. In pure sandy soils you have no life in the soil. You need organic matter to bring in life. By adding large feature rocks you are boosting habitats to foster small creatures. Plants that thrive are Succulents, Cacti, Sedums, Lavenders, yarrow, Mexican Orange, Dogwoods, Smoke Tree, Berberis and Amelanchier.

Clay Soils – small particles and it retains water well, but becomes compacted and poorly drained, it's also hard for roots to break through. Amending your soil properly can overcome these problems. Adding compost, leaves, pine bark or simply a bag of Clay Breaker. Plants suited to clay include Buddleja, Thuja, Viburnams, Weigela, NZ Natives Loamy Soils – are a balance mix of sand, silt and clay offering good drainage and nutrient retention. Ideal for gardening plants that thrive so take your pick.

Understanding the type of soil in your garden or landscape can save you a great deal of money in the long run even though we often learn from our mistakes. Take it from one who **now** knows. It's far easier to work with Mother Nature, than against her.
